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## 4-H Youth Development





The 4-H Chick Chain Project provides youth a fun and hands-on learning experience that develops life skills, as well as teaches valuable information about caring for birds. Youth also have the opportunity to develop responsibility, decision making, work ethic, nurturing and communication skills through active participation in the 4-H Poultry Project. In April, 4-H Chick Chain participants took home 12 or 25 day old chicks. The 4-H member had the choice of Barred Rock or Rhode Island Red pullets. They raised and cared for their birds until fair time. Each 4-H member brought back 3 or 6 of their now grown pullets to show and the birds are auctioned off as a fundraiser for Cheatham County 4-H. The families also were required to volunteer at the fair for three hours. Auctioneer, Stephen Carr, volunteered to auction off our birds and an average price of \$22 per bird was raised for 4-H.

Youth Leadership Cheatham County class of 2019-2020 kicked of the year with the opening retreat at Adventureworks in Kingston Springs. This year we have 16 participants, that represent schools from across the county. During their time at Adventureworks, these students get to know each other while working through team building exercises. This is just the first of 6 tours that the students will participate in throughout the year. The goal of the Youth Leadership Program is for students to learn about our government and community to help students foster the skills and strengths needed to become responsible citizens and leaders.









## Family & Consumer Sciences

Family and Community Education Club members stepped up to help take in entries, set up displays and provide security for the displays during the fair hours.
